Technology

There's no point in denying that our lives are full of technology. We rely on it for communication, marvel at its innovation and mine it for our entertainment choices. The following are some of the newest must-have gift items from the tech sector.

One of the coolest tech gifts of the year is the iPhone 5. Apple is touting it as "the thinnest, lightest, fastest iPhone ever." An iSight camera lets you shoot in panorama; new headphones are more comfortable; and a 4-inch Retina display, at 326 pixels per inch, makes seeing believing (from \$199; www.apple.com). A strong competitor to the iPhone is the Samsung Galaxy SIII, which runs on the Android software platform. The Galaxy offers ShareShot, a feature that allows users to share their photos instantly, and AllShare, a new technology in which users access and share any file on their phone (from \$149.99; www.samsung.com).

According to Seattle Times technology columnist Brier Dudley, there will be plenty of tablets under the tree this year, especially since there are more options in the \$200 range, such as Google's Nexus (\$199; www. play.google.com) and Amazon's Kindle Fire (\$199; www.kindle.amazon.com).

Microsoft is also planning to release two versions of its colorful new Surface

tablet this fall, which is expected to start at about \$499 (www.microsoft.com). Still, when talking tablets, the conversation has to center on the iPad. Apple's iPad 2, which was first released in 2011, starts at under \$400. The most recent focus has been on the third-generation iPad, which offers a crisper display, a 5-megapixel iSight camera and faster download speeds (starting at \$499; www.apple.com).

"Kids and gamers may also be excited about Nintendo's new Wii U console (\$130; www.nintendo.com)," Dudley says. "Out this month, [the Wii U] comes with its own wireless tablet for controlling games and watching video."

Streaming high-definition players for television are also making a splash in a big way in 2012, as more and more products allow consumers to surf the Web, as well as download movies and content on their TVs. The best-known product is the **Apple** TV (\$99; www.apple.com), which enables the viewer to access the content from all of the company's other devices, as well as from NetFlix and Hulu Plus, in one convenient spot. **Roku** (\$49.99; www.roku.com) weighs in with access to more than 100,000 titles from Amazon Instant Video, including new releases fresh from the big screen and premium content from HBO and other channels, as well as sports programming and news from NBC and The Wall Street Journal.

Netgear's NeoTV Pro (\$69.99; www. netgear.com) is challenging the competition with the addition of Intel's Wireless Display (WiDi) technology, which allows users to see their laptop display on the TV, conveniently accessed through a high-end touch-screen application that turns a smartphone into a remote control.

Videogame users have grown accustomed to gesture-based control systems, and now Leap is bringing the same technology to your computer. Leap (\$70; www. leapmotion.com) is going beyond the touch screen, forging the way for threedimensional computer navigation that tracks even the slightest natural hand and finger motions. Reliable, sensitive and accurate, Leap makes a mouse obsolete and is just about the size of a flash drive.

If the sound of all this technology is too much for you, try the new Phiaton noisecancellation earphones, which features Bluetooth 3.0 (\$159; www.phiaton.com). These compact buds block out 95 percent of background noise and allow the wearer to listen and control the volume of the music.

Bring the party with you with the **Etón** Rukus Solar portable Bluetooth speakers (\$150; www.etoncorp.com), with a solar panel so efficient that users can listen to

Made from recyclable materials, the il Eco can charge two devices at once and has an auto-off system to conserve electricity.

Perhaps the most important gift of all for the smartphone user on your holiday gift radar is a waterproofing treatment from **Liquipel** (\$59; www.liquipel.com). The award-winning product protects the device—inside and out—without affecting its performance.

For those seeking greater safety while on the road, the auto-communications company OnStar is offering the **FMV**. The name is an acronym meaning "For My Vehicle" (\$99.99 and \$18.95 a month; www.onstar.com). OnStar supplies a new rearview mirror with buttons that connect the driver to a series of safety features, such as GPS navigation, stolen-vehicle location, links to emergency services and automatic crash assistance.

For the person on your list who likes to venture into nature and out of cellphone range, a pair of Motorola **Talkabout MS350R** two-way radios (\$99.99; www.motorola. com) is the perfect way to safely stay connected. With a range of up to 35 miles, these completely waterproof walkie-talkies float, have LED flashlights and hands-free capability, and come connected to seven NOAA weather channels for up-to-theminute alerts and information.

Travel in Style

The following gifts are aimed at making the traveling experience easier, more comfortable and more enjoyable.







After 9-year-old Rachel Beckwith died in a Seattle traffic accident in 2011, her parents turned their tragedy into hope for others by continuing Rachel's campaign through Charity: Water, a nonprofit that gives 100 percent of the money donated to provide clean drinking water to people in underdeveloped countries. Since Rachel's passing, contributions to her campaign have reached nearly \$1.27 million, enough money to supply clean water to more than
